


Jenny Seagrove and Sara Crowe star as best friends Julia and Jane, in a new production of Noël Coward's sparkling comedy.



The self-centred behaviour of the hosts finally drives their guests to flee, while the Blisses are so engaged in a family row that they fail to notice their quests' furtive departure. Often described as a cross between high farce and a comedy of manners, Hay Fever is a highly entertaining and funny insight into the world of Noël Coward.

In the interests of keeping you up-to-date and informed about the progress of the creation of the Sherborne Community Arts Centre here is the full text of a statement recently issued by the trustees.



SCACT - STATEMENT - December 2013

Since the Town Council meeting in September where it was decided to withdraw Town Council support for the Community Arts Centre project, which the Town Council had instigated by resolution in August 2009 there has been a lot of confusion in the town as to what is happening. This has been aggravated by misreporting in the local press and mis-understandings which in a small town gain amazing weight as they get repeated in the coffee shops and pubs.

In August 2013 the Trustees offered to release the Town Council from their pledge of £40,000 towards the build costs as they were aware that the town was very short of reserves with which to maintain the town's multi-million pound property portfolio. At the council meeting on the 16 September the Council resolved to accept the offer, but at the same time withdrew their support for the project and agreed to start a 12 month feasibility study into the future of the Digby Hall. This study was to involve the three tiers of local government and SCACT. The Trustees had hoped the council would discuss an alternative resolution that they had submitted prior to the meeting that would have adopted all the proposed resolutions with the exception of withdrawing support. The Trustees regret that this was not discussed.

The project had begun with the backing of the local MP, Oliver Letwin, and both the County and District Councils. Following the Town Council decision the Trustees discussed the situation with both County and District councils and were reassured by both that the project still had the full support of both Councils.

The costs so far of running the project are about £90,000. This covers things like architects fees, legal and planning fees, publicity material, fundraising materials, professional support and advice, and insurance. The cash to cover this has largely come from WDDC (£65,150) who realised that this type of project needed money just to run before the actual building phase. Other funding has come from a



number of sources including Sherborne Town Council (£16,500).

The minutes of the November 2013 WDDC Executive Committee state: "That the council continues to support the Sherborne Community Arts Centre Trust project in accordance with the Corporate Plan but retains the currently allocated financial resources in order to contribute to construction costs."

This has been misunderstood to suggest that WDDC no longer support the project, whereas what it actually means is that the first call on any donations, subject to the donor's agreement, will be spent by the Trustees on achieving our funding goal, which remains "to have completed our full funding of £1.725 million by 21 September 2014."

The Trustees continue to drive towards this goal recognising that the target amount and the current financial environment are both challenging. Their belief in the project comes from a vision for Sherborne that includes not only a beautiful new building for the community to use, but one that will bring people into Sherborne. When added to the forthcoming attractions to be offered at Sherborne House, Oliver Letwin's vision of a Sherborne Arts Quarter could become the hub of a new era of prosperity and inclusivity for the town.

The Trustee's are grateful to all the people who have expressed support for the project and are committed to do their upmost to deliver the vision.
