
NOISES OFF

'KEEPING OUR END UP"

We are half-way through our rehearsal schedule for Keeping Our End Up, and I'm delighted to report that our cast of five APS ladies have gelled well together onstage, to create a credible and lovable imaginary Longfield Bishop Bowls Team. They know all their words - mostly - and don't bump into each other any more. The dialogue works, and the teamwork shines through. Sherborne Bowling Club have kindly loaned us a huge number of props which will decorate the stage and, hopefully, will spirit you away to a Bowls Pavilion in Middle England.

When you come to see this, you will be watching only the second ever production of this play. It was written in 2019, by Mark Carey, a talented TV actor and occasional playwright, and

first performed at the Loft Theatre in Leamington Spa in April of that year. Then the pandemic struck, and o t h e r s c h e d u l e d productions around the country were subsequently



postponed. We at APS are the first to pick it up and perform it since the restrictions were relaxed. The APS team read it as a Zoom play when we weren't allowed to meet in person, and instantly fell in love with

it. The clever but gentle humour, blended with the touching depiction of five ladies struggling with reallife problems, really struck a chord with us. Set against a background of a bowls team languishing at the bottom of the league, it neatly balances a sentimental vision of middle-class, middle-England with believable and often tragic stories bubbling just below the surface.

So, when you come to see it, I hope the women in the audience will laugh and maybe cry at the bits of these women that they recognise in themselves. And I hope the men, like me, will also laugh and cry and maybe understand a little better and empathise a little more.

AUDITION CALL - "BETRAYAL"

Our December production is to be Betrayal by Harold Pinter, one of his finest plays, remarkable for its reverse chronology and the range of emotions constantly seething between the lines of a script which uses language with economy, precision and humour. The 'betrayal' in question begins as the seduction, by a literary agent, of his best friend's wife. Performed on a minimal set, it demands subtle acting. with careful attention to the significance of every word, gesture and pause. As the play runs backwards in time from the end of the affair to

its feverish but doomed beginning, audiences can see more into the characters and their motivation than they can themselves.

There are four parts: two men, Jerry and Robert - should be about the same age, 30-40, can look 40-50 (or vice versa); one woman: Emma, similar age, perhaps a little younger. (These are three substantial parts.) Also there is an Italian waiter/ waitress, any age, in only one scene, with just a few lines.

Betrayal will be directed by Graham Smith (who also

directed *Educating Rita* earlier this year).

Rehearsals will start in October, and the performances will take place on 5th-10th December.

Auditions will take place at 7.30pm on Tuesday 13th September in the theatre - but if this is impossible (or if you have questions) please call Graham on 01747 855295 to express your interest and arrange an alternative time, probably in the week beginning 3rd October.
