THANK YOU, MALCOLM!

It is with great pleasure that we are able to report probably the most exciting development for APS in recent years. As announced in our President's Report to the AGM on 21st July (see below), Malcolm Cockburn. one of our longest-standing members, and the present owner of the Theatre, has taken the extraordinarily generous step of making a gift of the building to the APS in perpetuity. As tenants, we had already been benefiting extremely from advantageous terms, by way of a peppercorn rent. Malcolm's latest act of kindness means that any uncertainty about our future home has been removed. Our President, Mark Lambert, included the following tribute of gratitude to Malcolm in his Report:

Malcolm has been a member of The Plavers for far longer than I have. In fact more or less twice as long, as he first joined nearly 60 years ago. From 1964 to 1985 he took part in Salad Days, Present Laughter, The Boy Friend, An Ideal Husband, Not Now Darling, A Hundred Years Old, Without Prejudice, Outside Edge, Private Lives and Gaslight. Then, for about 15 years Malcolm was not an active member – I suspect he may have moved away for a while. But in 2002 he reappeared to play a small but totally unforgettable part in One Flew over the Cuckoo's Nest (ask him about that role). He followed that up with roles in Julius Caesar, When We Are Married, A Ghost on Tiptoe and Busman's Honeymoon. Many of you will remember him in his last role as the Narrator in our 2016 production of <u>Great</u> <u>Expectations.</u> 52 years after his first appearance on the APS stage. And, of course, his is the voice you hear before every performance in this theatre, pointing out the fire exits and loos to the audience and exhorting them to turn off their phones.

So. Malcolm's interest in and loyalty to APS goes back a very long time. And that loyalty has been now been demonstrated in spades. Late last year, in consultation with the other Trustees, Malcolm decided that he would hand this building over to APS. The necessary legal steps have been in process for some time, and I ... can confidently take enormous pleasure in telling you that very shortly the Sherborne Studio Theatre will be the property of APS.

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THE AGM

Upwards of 20 members of APS came along to the Annual General Meeting and Summer Party, on 21st July.

The outgoing Chair, Jessica Colson, outlined the success of our four productions during the year, and reflected on the relatively healthy state of our finances, which the Treasurer, Sarah Webster, subsequently presented in detail.

Two minor alterations to the wording of the Constitution were agreed (one of which will have the effect of reducing the size of the Committee in future years).

Other Business included discussions on discounted tickets, air-conditioning, solar panels, publicity and the need to have first-aiders present during performances.

Once formal business was concluded, all enjoyed the refreshments provided (for which, many thanks to Bev Taylor-Wade), and the Bar was open for all.


Please note that it is no longer the intention to perform the show over more than one week. The performances will be between December 4th-9th 2023 (only).

Rehearsals for *Art* are in full swing (and going very well), and the set construction is nearing completion.

Art is a comedy that raises questions about art and friendship. Set in Paris, the play revolves around three friends, Serge, Marc, and Yvan. Serge, indulging his penchant for modern art, buys a large, extremely expensive painting that is in fact completely white. Marc

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friendship starts to suffer considerable strain as a result of their differing opinions about what constitutes "art". Yvan, caught in the middle of the conflict, tries to please and mollify both of them, but his attempts only serve to attract his friends' criticism for his vacillation and apparent lack of opinion.

The play is being performed on September 18th - 23rd, with tickets going on sale on Monday August 21st. As always, you are urged to buy your tickets early, to avoid disappointment. TICKETPRICES

Nobody needs to be reminded of the fact that the cost of living is rising rapidly. At APS we are obviously not immune to this: we have been hit very hard by increases in the costs of heating and lighting, and of insurance. What might be less well known is the fact that a substantial slice (sometimes in the region of £600 £700) of our income for performances has to be handed over for licence fees (royalties) and the purchase of scripts. These costs have also escalated of late

The Committee has therefore taken the reluctant decision to increase the price of tickets with immediate effect. For evening performances, Standard seats will now be priced at £12, and Premium seats (front row, and raised rows) will be £14. Matinée performances will be £11 and £13.



We recently took yet another step in the development of the Sherborne Studio Theatre as an attractive and viable theatrical venue.

Until now, in order to sell alcoholic drinks to audience members - which forms an important part of our revenue - we have had to apply to the County Council for a temporary licence separately for each production. This is both a bureaucratic and expensive process. The Committee therefore took the decision to apply for a permanent Premises Licence, and we are glad to report that this process was successful. We are now fully licensed!
