"ART"

For those members of the audience who had previously attended Pinter's *Betrayal* in December of last year, we could be forgiven for experiencing a slight feeling of déjà vu whilst enjoying *Art* in the Studio Theatre this week. A three-hander, a stripped-back set, friendships between middle-

aged men laid bare, examined and tested to destruction. Even the cast -Alex Scrivenor and Chris Williamson - and the director Graham Smith - were back for more. Only the irrepressible Sarah Nias was missing (although spotted among the audience - she just can't keep away), the third hand being taken up by Andrew Middleton, last seen as the mild-mannered detective in Witness for the *Prosecution*, and now playing the equally mild-mannered,

inoffensive and sommewhat bewildered Yvan to perfection.

Obviously it does little justice to *Art* to make lengthy comparisons with another play. It is a splendid work in its own right. Whereas the title might not be the most inviting, there is no doubt that the debate concerning the questions: What is Art? When does being "cultured" cross over into being pretentious? How do you affirm friendship while being



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honest with your friends? are presented in the cleverest, lightest and funniest of ways. The audience, of which I was a part, were relaxed and laughing within seconds of the play's beginning, and our enjoyment, engagement and focus never let up.

Alex and Chris as Marc and Serge made a great pairing, probing and prodding each other's attitudes and opinions, and occasionally ganging up on the hapless Yvan, who was horrified to witness the apparent disintegration of his friends' relationship, while inadvertently acting as a catalyst for their exasperation.

This was an absolute tour de force by all three - a huge task to master the script, yet performed with confidence, aplomb and faultless stagecraft. Congratulations to all three, and to Graham, who, although not a very longstanding APS member, has already assembled an impressive portfolio of directorial successes with us. As ever, the audience members left the theatre with the warmest of praise and compliments. The APS bar has been raised yet again!





MAJOR PROJECT - GRANTAPPLICATION

Over the course of the summer a number of committee members, in particular Adrian Harding and Richard Jones, put in a tremendous amount of work on behalf of the APS in order to submit a bid for funding. The bid was for a grant from the snappily-named Wolfson Foundation Theatres Trust Theatre Improvement Scheme for Improving Environmental Sustainability, and the hope is that, if successful, we will receive funding towards the replacement of our stock of lighting with state-of-the-art LED lights. The benefits of these are that they clearly use a great deal less electricity and thus enhance our alreadyimpressive "green credentials", but also that they give off far less heat. The issue of an overheated stage and auditorium in the summer is a perennial one for us, and gives us a lot of concern for the comfort of actors, audience, and especially the gallery crew.

We are confident that Adrian and Richard have put together a strong bid, but there will be a great deal of competition, and the outcome will not be known until December. Wish us luck!
