It is a long time since The Players put on a production with so many young people. Of the 26-strong cast, 14 were under the age of 18, and a number of the adults involved have be __neard to say how much they have enjoyed working with them.

It is probably fair to say that with such a large cast more rehearsal time would have been an advantage, but all the cast worked very hard in the time available and the production came together very well, with some excellent performances.

Fiona Stewart, with her lovely clear voice, gave us a delightful Alice and it was very bad luck when her voice started to give out during the Thursday performance. However, her misfortune gave her understudy the chance to metamorphose from a caterpillar into Alice and, after one brief on-stage rehearsal on the Friday morning, Kirstie Stone acquitted herself well in two performances, with a determined Fiona returning to the role on the Saturday night.

he heroines of Tony Field's production team were, of course, the wardrobe ladies, Pauline Tillett and Kathy Messinger, who both slaved for weeks making the 38 intricate and colourful costumes. Not forgetting, of course, all the other members of the very strong and hard-working backstage team, all of whom put in many hours of work, sometimes late into the night, setting up and eventually taking down the stage, props, set, lights and sound.

Five performances were hard work for all concerned, but were necessary because of the seating limitations. Predictably, the matinée proved to be the most popular of all, and for obvious reasons a higher proportion than usual of the 430 or so people who came to see the show were children. As a result the gross amount taken for tickets sales was probably a bit lower than one would normally expect for the number of people. But expenses were not excessive and although the

income and expenditure figures have not yet been finalised I guess that we have probably made a profit. Congratulations to Margaret Field and all her cast and production team.

Recent Events

There were only six people (about which more later) at Jason Hepple's unrehearsed pantomime readings, but even so we had great fun reading through several short pantomimes that Jason had written for hospital events in Bournemouth.

The Annual Dinner, immaculately organised once again by Tony Birks-Hay, took place at the Eastbury Hotel. Opinions varied as to the quality of the food, but all agreed that that the ambiance of the Eastbury was far pleasanter than the Sherborne Hotel and it was a very enjoyable evening. Roderick Taylor, the guest speaker, provided us with an entertaining and, at the end, quite emotional, account of his involvement with theatre around the world. Our thanks to him and to Tony.

Finally, at the beginning of March, Dod Pearson and Jean Harrap organised an entertaining unrehearsed play reading of two one-act plays. Some 15 members had a very enjoyable read.

APS Club Evenings

Club evenings are an long-standing institution, dating back to the 1950s, shortly after the first APS Constitution was drawn up and the first official Committee was formed. The purpose behind these evenings was then, and remains today, to provide members with events that combine both social and educational elements. Most evenings, it is hoped, are entertaining and some help to teach us more about acting or drama in general. Others are purely social; they provide occasions when members can meet without necessarily having to take part in a rehearsal, thus helping to make APS a more cohesive society.

Having said that, low attendance at players evenings has always been a matter of some comment. There are statements in past committee minutes as far back as the 1950s that refer to the fact that a disappointingly small number of members attend. In recent years, apart from social evenings, which normally attract about half the membership, an attendance of 20 or so members at APS evenings has been regarded as normal, if sometimes a little discouraging. However, in the past two years attendances seem to have declined even further and the presence of just 6 people at Jason's pantomime play readings in January this year was an all-time low.

There is, at present, no intention of abandoning the idea of club evenings; the principles outlined above apply just as much today as they did 50 years ago. But the Committee would like to try and discover why the decline has taken place. Is the idea of a Players' evening simply too boring to contemplete? Are the competing interests of TV, cinema, bingo or other outside social events too strong? Do members find the clubroom too unattractive? Should we be trying to find different ideas for evenings and, if so, what would appeal most to members?

Hence the enclosed questionaire. I know that long-standing members will recall si surveys in the past. But time has moved on and the membership has changed. This survey has been designed to attempt to answer the questions outlined above and we would appreciate it if <u>all</u> members, new and old, could spare a few minutes to fill it in and return it. As an incentive, our Chairman, Jason Hepple, is donating **a bottle of champagne**, the winner of which will be the person named on the first completed survey form drawn from the box at the Chairman's evening on April 25th.
