Col. Desmond de S. Rinder-Sparrow: English accent. Landed gentry: a decent fellow but rather dim.

Col. Wesley Breitenspiegel: American accent. New York neurotic.

Col. Aimé Frappot: French accent. Sophisticated, cynical, world-weary.

Col. Alexander Ikonenko: Russian accent. A devout Stalinist. Humourless. A stickler for protocol.

The Immortals

(All speak at various times in English, American, French and Russian accents)

Donovan, the Good Fairy (female): Very young, very sweet, very kind.

Carabosse, the Bad Fairy (male): Very old. Very, very wicked.

The Sleeping Beauty: Every man's ideal of his perfect woman.

Smaller parts:

The Wives

Mrs. Rinder-Sparrow: English accent. Brisk and unemotional.

Mrs. Breitenspeigel: American accent. Modern, brittle and outspoken.

Mme. Frappot: French accent. Gentle and resigned.

Mme. Ikonenko: Non-speaking part (breast-feeds her baby -- discreetly).

And

The Mayor of Herzogenburg: Central European accent. A prophet of doom.

Yes folks a review of both plays has been published nationally in the latest NODA magazine, a bit late, but its there. I have attached a copy of these below



JULIUS CAESAR Amateur Players of Sherborne Cheap Street Church
Director: David South

All else apart, it is no small achievement in itself to east Julius Caesar, let alone perform it. Needing at least nineteen men, many of whom would have to play two parts, how many societies could field this number from their membership who were capable of playing Shakespeare? The Amater's Players of Sherborne can, and most efficiency mo. Director David Smith's performers did him much credit by delivering some accomplished acting. Notable among these were Patrick Knox as Cassius and Charles Nopier as Brutus, wasse powerful interchange in Act IV was particularly impressive. The grouping and movement of the characters were well choreographed, including the crowd scenes where the illusion of a mass of people was convincingly achieved by a handful of players. Visually the play was striking thanks to a large suite of authentic costumes and some effective lighting. Although played without set and the minimum of propagod use was made of the architecture within the Cheap Street Church to represent the Roman scenes. The action of the play was punctuated throughout by some well chosen music, glediatorial in nature, which served to enhance the overall diamatic effect. All in all, this was a time production deserving of a better actioned support than it get.

OUT OF SIGHT, OUT OF MURDER Amateur Players of Sherborne Digby Hall

An original twist to the "wheelmain" theme, where an author's prospective characters come to life in a dumknistorm to help him over his writer's block, the characters naving widely-varying ideas as to who I out it be villain and victims in the eventual book. This highly entertaining American comedy-drama was a purply staged by the Players in every respect. An excellent setting by Charles Napier, depicting a gloomy old measurem with speedy overtices, prompted spontaneous applicase as the curtains opened at the start of the play.
