So soon it seemed, we were in the Digby Hall with the scenery up and time for the Technical Rehearsal, Dress Rehearsals and - First Night.



Annual Dinner at The Crown




It was knives and forks at the ready, heads down and tuck in at The Crown, Friday evening 27th March. And a sumptuous feast it was.

FAMOUS NAMES OF THE STAGI

Born 8 September, 1933, playwright and novelist Michael Frayn is best known as the author of the farce Noises Off and the dramas Copenhagen and Democracy. All his plays had a modest West End



success and established Frayn as a writer of highly intelligent comedy. But it was with Noises Off (1982) that he achieved both an instant commercial hit and international fame.

His novels, such as Towards the End of the Morning, Headlong and Spies, have also been critical and commercial successes, making him one of the handful of writers in the English language to succeed in both drama and prose fiction.

His films for television include *First and Last* (1989), for which he won an Emmy, and an adaptation of his novel *A Landing on the Sun*. He also wrote the screenplay for *Clockwise* (1986), a comedy starring John Cleese.

IN THIS MONTH

In April 1962 the Hollywood musical West Side Story, an updated Romeo and Juliet tale set in gang-ridden New York, sweeps the Oscars. The movie, based on the Broadway hit by Leonard Bernstein and Stephen Sondheim, won 10 Academy Awards, including Best Picture, Best Supporting Actor and Actress, and Best Director.


