As you'll have seen in the last newsletter, we are intending to mark the 75th anniversary of the APS by reviving the first play we ever performed. It's called "Tons of Money" – a traditional 1920's Aldwych farce, which isn't as

cobwebby as it sounds because it was rejigged recently by Alan Ayckbourn for the National Theatre, and had a successful run there with Simon Cadell, Polly Adams and Michael Gambon in the leads.

We'll announce audition dates soon, but just to get you thinking, here is the cast list:

Louise Allington – the leading female role. Bright, clever, scheming, with a cool head in the inevitable crises.

Aubrey Allingham – the leading male role. Louise's husband, and the reluctant performer of her schemes. Appears at different points disguised as a vicar and as his own long-lost brother.

Benita Mullett – Aubrey's deaf old aunt who is not as daft as he thinks she is. Knits a lot.

Jean Everard – A friend of Louise, who turns out to be married to Aubrey's longlost brother.

Sprules – a scheming butler with an eye for the money

Simpson – a parlourmaid, in love with Sprules

James Chesterman – a dry-as-dust London solicitor

Giles – the gardener. Small comic cameo role

Henery – Sprules' brother, impersonating Aubrey's long-lost brother (Act III only) George Maitland – At last: Aubrey's genuine long-lost brother (Act III only)

BIG CHALLENGE FOR APS



King Lear is going to be an enormous challenge for the APS – but having seen the Club at work I believe we can meet the challenge and make a great success of the production. But there's no point in denying that it will mean a lot of work for

all involved.

Especially for me: it will mean me spending the entire summer analysing the text line by line, reading every book on the subject of Lear that I can lay hands on, producing an outline blocking plan, designing the set, finding costumes, briefing the man who composes my music, liaising with lights and sound, and so on and on - every director will know whereof I speak!

I hope you'll agree that it's only fair to expect a similar kind of commitment from everyone else - including attendance at rehearsals without fail except in cases of dire emergency, and early mastery of lines so that we can get on with more important things like interpretation. I know my directing style has been described, politely, as idiosyncratic! In rehearsals I become very focused and the niceties of polite society sometimes leave me. But it's all in the cause of producing the very best we can for what is after all a paying audience. I hope those who take part will come to feel that it's all worthwhile!

All of that brings me to my main point. Both I and your committee need to know **now** if there are sufficient actors prepared, in principle (because anything can happen between now and the October audition), to commit themselves to this production - and this director! So, I am asking those actors who are interested to please contact me before the AGM on 24th July

heatrical Anecdotes



Although Henry Irving's productions at the Lyceum Theatre earned him a knighthood (the first ever awarded to a thespian) in 1895, his decision to pursue acting (long considered a dodgy profession) drew considerable scorn.

"In his first night in London," Kenneth Branagh once recalled, "Irving had this huge personal success in Richard the Third or something, and he was going home, across Hyde Park in a hansom cab with his [sophisticated] missus. There'd been a standing ovation and it was obvious he had arrived'. It was a wonderful, wonderful evening. His wife turned to him and said, 'How long are you

going to go on making a fool of yourself like this?' Irving stopped the cab, got out, walked home, collected his things, left - and never saw her again."

Wole Sovinka, considered Africa's most distinguished playwright and the first African to win the "Nobel Prize in Literature" was born 13 July, 1934 in Nigeria. In 1994, he was designated UNESCO Goodwill Ambassador for the promotion of African culture, human rights, freedom of expression, media and communication. Soyinka has been imprisoned several times for his criticism of the Nigerian government. From the 1970s he has lived long periods in exile. Soyinka's plays range from comedy to tragedy, and from political satire to the theatre of the absurd.

TONS OF MONEY Background



Will Evans, star of British music-hall and pantomime, was born in London either on 29 May 1867, 29 May 1867 or some time in 1875. He was the son of Fred Evans, a celebrated acrobat and clown and with whom he made his first appearance in 1881 in Robinson

Crusoe at Drury Lane. He then toured with his father's troupe, returning to London in 1890 to appear on the 'halls' with his wife and, after her death, as a solo eccentric -

meaning acrobatic - comedian.

He specialised in scenes of domestic chaos, of which the most popular were 'Building a Chicken House', 'Whitewashing the Ceiling', and "Papering a House'. He also



sang, danced and played many instruments. Several of his sound recordings survive.

It seems to be agreed that he died in London on April 11, 1931, aged 64.



FAMOUS NAMES OF THE STAGE
Aphra Behn was the first professional woman writer in English literature, best known for her plays and her novel 'Oroonoko'. She was born near Canterbury in July 1640 and is thought to have spent some of her youth in the West Indies. In 1664 she married Johan Behn a merchant, but the marriage is not thought to have lasted very long. She is known to have acted as a British spy in Antwerp in 1666. Imprisonment for debt led her to write for an income and she wrote a series of plays. Her first, The Forc'd Marriage' was produced in 1671. 'The Rover' (1681), her most successful, was produced in two parts and included in its cast Nell Gwyn, mistress of King Charles II. Among Behn's sources was the Italian commedia dell'arte, which she used in her farce 'The Emperor of the Moon' (1687), forerunner of the modern-day pantomime. Behn's novel 'Oroonoko' (1688) was the story of an enslaved African prince and is now considered a foundation stone in the development of the English novel. In her time she was a celebrity, unusual for her independence as a professional writer and her concern for equality between the sexes. Behn died on 16 April 1689 and was buried in Westminster Abbey.

By Virginia Woolf's reckoning, Behn's total career is more important than any particular work it produced. Woolf wrote, "All women together, ought to let flowers fall upon the grave of Aphra Behn...for it was she who earned them the right to speak their minds."
