FORWARD IDEAS FOR APS AND THE CHAPEL



The recent productions have been excellent and a credit to the directors, however it seems that we can no longer fill the Digby Hall with a large enough audience to cover our costs. Sadly this cannot go on for long and I can see no future for the society unless we scale back our production costs. I look at

the Theatre Royal Bath and see that the two smaller venues, The Ustinov and Egg, put on successful productions with small audiences and often minimal scenery. I suggest that we might consider using the chapel in the same way to keep our talent and our many faithful patrons.

This would involve a fairly drastic re-modelling of the interior, but it is probably time this was done anyway. The flats and general scenery (which are pretty decrepit) are using the major part of the downstairs and, frankly, could be scrapped. If the upstairs was to be retained the internal pillars could be relocated to the side. I would be happy to ask an architect to give views.

There are many implications of health and safety, public access, fire and all those things which would complicate my ideas, but it is not impossible. Public parking is available at the Acreman Street car park.

A time scale could begin with assessment in the next couple of months, shifting of the flats etc at the time of the Autumn production and thereafter start work on remodling the interior. The props need not be moved until later but in the end that space would be needed for access to the stage. I would not expect the work to be done in time for a Spring production in the chapel.


Doors open 7:15 pm, show starts 7:45 pm.

brought me the plans he has done of the chapel as it is now. A copy will be available at the opening night and people can ponder on it. Tom, is going to find out all the bureaucratic hoops we will have to go through for 'change of use' to a theatre (however small), health and safety, car parking etc.



He is well qualified in this because at the moment he works for Fry's the main contractors for Poundbury. I have not allowed myself too many thoughts about how I visualise the alterations except to think that we should remove the upstairs floor as far back as the second truss away from the door (see upstairs) and make the 'stage' end of the chapel full height.
