

ROSE BOWL TRIUMPHS!

With no fewer than four nominations for awards for APS, hopes and expectations were high that we would be carrying at least one gong home from the Rose Bowl Awards ceremony in Bristol on November 30th.

After all, as a society that regularly punches above its weight, firmly established as one of the leading amateur groups in the South West, APS has a good track record when it comes to honours and awards.

Our 2025 nominees were **Sarah Nias**, for Best Actress in *Hedda Gabler*, **Freddie Wopat**, for Best Supporting Actor in the same play, **Hazel Perrett** for Best Young Actress in *The 39*

Steps, and the same play's silhouetted chase effect was nominated for the Coup de Théâtre Award.

was the third time Sarah

ROSE BOWL - CITATIONS

Sarah Nias (Best Actress):

"Hedda is such a complex character and you managed to show us the whole range of emotions churning inside her. On the surface, Hedda is controlling, selfish, powercrazy and manipulative. Under all of that, she was frightened, vulnerable and sad. Once she began to see that her power was being taken away, she crumbled, and that was sensitively portrayed. Your voice was perfect for this role and echoed through the space; your movements around the stage supported all that we were beginning to understand about this character.

Many will have wondered why you ever married Tesman, but of course we soon learn that this was a cry for help - to buy some respectability and security - a price that proved too high. For without love, none of that matters. This was a superb performance and you absolutely deserve this Award."

The 39 Steps (Coup de Théâtre):

"This hugely inventive and laughter-filled production of "The 39 Steps" was performed at the tiny Sherborne Studio Theatre, where, on a stage of less than 12 square metres, a cast of four played 40 characters with 68 costume changes and 300 sound and lighting cues. However, all this was then topped with a dramatic chase across sweeping Scottish moorland, including an



aerial pursuit, portrayed by use of back-projected shadow puppetry that wowed adjudicator and audience alike."



SHE STOOPS TO CONQUER

APS had been due to perform Oliver Goldsmith's masterpiece back in the Autumn of 2017, but the project was abandoned due to the difficulty of casting the play. Fast forward to 2025. and no such problem was apparent as John Crabtree succeeded in staging a lively, sparkling rendition making full use of what one visiting critic described as APS's "deep well of talent". What is so encouraging for the future of our Society is the fact that half of the cast occupying said "well" were new recruits to APS, delighting and enthralling the audiences with their energy, youthfulness and obvious zest for the stage. More of that later.

John has, of course, a long and distinguished track record of directing memorable and (in many cases) awardwinning plays with APS. This was up there with his best. The 18th-century dialogue

seemed to leap off the page, the richness of its sounds and cadences given full justice by the cast, the wit and humour of every line pacy and delicious. Lighting, sound (with an original composition by Mike Stanley) and costume were on point, as always, but most of all the set was stunning in its versatility, fully naturalistic and able to be converted in seconds (by the very efficient stage crew) from house, to inn, to garden and back again.

It is impossible not to be uplifted by *She Stoops*, and like any classic, it is as relevant today as always. Who could fail to enjoy Marlow's absurd class and gender prejudices being exposed and stripped away by Kate, or the ability of love to cross (even fictitious) class boundaries? Or the ways in which Marlow's - and Mrs Hardcastle's - weaknesses



are handled as endearing characteristics, to be cherished and appreciated, while we keep some of our loudest laughter for the buffoonish - soon to be wealthy and even more idle -Lumpkin, the perfect "entitled The reactions of the Sherborne audiences, and the very real warmth of their comments when departing, showed that the director and cast perfectly hit the sweet spot of the play's enduring appeal.

With a cast about as large as our Green Room can accommodate - even with doubling-up - it is hard to comment on individual performances without leaving unfair omissions. So, while giving a nod to the great performances of the evergreen APS favourites present, the warmest of welcomes should be given to







the newcomers - Olivia Kippax, Christiana Bingley. Peter Sangston, Cameron Thrower (actually a welcome returnee after several years' absence), all of whom are now firmly established as APS stars in their own right. Most of all, the other two newcomers - Sam Frost and

Catarina da Silva - playing the main characters of Marlow and Kate, proved what "finds" they are, as, both individually and as a couple. audience in the palm of their hands. the word) dominated the

This production of She Stoops brought warmth and laughter to our cold little theatre on a week of wet, dark December evenings. and, to judge from the audience reactions, is sure to take its place among our ever-growing collection of hits. Nobody could fail to agree with Charles Marlow's observation to Kate: "I was always willing to be amused. The folly of most people is rather an object of mirth than uneasiness."

MUCH ADO ABOUTFALSTAFF

Giles Shenton, who won us over last year with his one-man performance of *Three Men In A Boat*, made a very welcome return to Sherborne in October with *Much Ado about Falstaff*.

It was a lively and irreverent parody that reimagined the legendary and dubious exploits of Sir John Falstaff with wit and affection. Written specifically for Giles by Simon Downing, the show dives into the chaotic life of Falstaff, painting a portrait of a penniless, lovable roque whose greatest talents are drinking, starting fights he never finishes, and endlessly running away from trouble and - above all - a motley army of creditors. "It would sooner snow in hell than your purse be full". Giles (and Georgie Taylor, playing the hapless Mistress Quickly), captured our hearts from the outset with their endearing but inexplicable mutual devotion.

The show's comedic highlights were nearly all based on unpleasant bodily functions, yet the narrative

was peppered with clever wordplay and physical humour. It was also a comic exploration of the morality of the time, making it a true celebration of Shakespearean farce.

The production explored Falstaff's many faults-his fondness for sack (both wine and the bed), his impecunious state, and his endless hedonistic appetite - "If you know of greater things than food, drink, and fornication, pray tell". Yet, beneath the belching, farting, cowardly glutton, Giles wanted us to have a genuine affection for his character "made of sturdy English oak" as the audience is invited to love him despite (or perhaps because of) his flaws. Mistress Quickly,



brilliantly played by Georgie as a perfect counterpoint to the old scoundrel – lists his manifold failings but sums it up with: "Yet I do love him. I



do so wish to eke out our final years together"

Overall, Much Ado about Falstaff was a spirited homage to one of literature's great comic figures, and the parody didn't shy away from poking fun at the unforgivable bad behaviour and the endless cycle of misadventures that define Falstaff's existence.

With Falstaff and Mistress Quickly, Giles and Georgie ensured that the Sherborne audience all enjoyed their journey back in time to share in the revelry.

He took part in a range of productions and the roles he played were Max in Ten Times Table (1986), Harris in After Magritte (1987), Arthur Harnam in The Day After the Fair (1989), Geoffrey Day in Under the Greenwood Tree (1991), Ray Turnbull in Dead Ringer (1992), John Fearnley in Moving (1994), Stingo in She Stoops to Conquer (1995), Trevor Farrington in Theft (1999), Corin in As You Like It (2000), The Vicar in Confusions: Gosforth's Fete (2006), Mr Shanks in Habeas Corpus (2007), Herbert Soppit in When We Are Married (2009) and Badger in The Wind in the Willows (2010). He was to have played Caesar in Julius Caesar (2007), but unfortunately had to pull out due to ill health. John was a kind, gentle and thoughtful man. He is sadly missed by those who knew him, and our condolences go to his family.


